

WELCOME FROM THE SECRETARY

With the news of more diseases circulating in Europe and the UK you can be forgiven for feeling a bit despondent about the sheep sector, but there are many aspects which are good news for us.

Sheep production is one of the most sustainable industries in agriculture and this is an important aspect for us all to consider in the future. It is also an excellent conduit for young entrants into agriculture; you certainly might not be able to afford farmland, but a small flock grazing on rented grassland is a way into sheep farming for many. The increasing interest in regenerative farming is also highlighting the need for livestock and mainly sheep to integrate with crop production.

Thankfully prices for all categories of sheep have been strong during 2024 and look to continue this way. On the flip side we are all too aware of rising costs and expenditure must be kept in check to ensure profitability. The Government will certainly not be filling the gap, as they accelerate the reduction in support payments. There will be rewards for schemes that deliver environmental benefits and reduce our carbon footprint and increase natural biodiversity.

Despite these high prices the consumption and demand for lamb and ewe meat has increased. Lamb is seen as a high-quality protein with a high price tag; so, we have to make sure it is a top quality product and maintain our reputation.

All these factors bode well for our Charollais breed, if we continue to breed the right type of

animals that suit the emerging demands. We have the genetics that can get a quality carcase lamb to market quickly and at a weight that is profitable. Our rams breed prime lambs with length and shape, excellent muscling and tender flavoursome meat. Days to slaughter is one of the most influential factors in the reduction of carbon footprint. We are pushing ahead with genomic selection and this will give us the tools for further improvement on carbon reduction in our stock.

We have always put emphasis on rams that are 'fit for purpose' and this will continue. Charollais rams do live and work hard. We will continue to push all these messages to potential buyers at shows, sales, events and through our social media platforms. There will be a total of five National Sheep Association days this year, so come along to one near you, there is always lots to see and learn and why not do a stint on the Charollais stand and promote your own flock to visitors.

Members shouldn't underestimate the positive aspect that taking part in Society activities can have for your wellbeing. More and more farmers are isolated on their farms with little interaction with others; purchasing is done online contributing to fewer trips to the local market and less staff on farm. It's good to get away from the farm for a time, have a conversation with others and often see things in a different light. So, we urge you to join in with your region.

And if you want a chat we are always here in the office and happy to help. Hope to see you soon.



ANNUAL REPORT 2024

Last year was a mixed year for the Charollais Society. We were all shocked and saddened by the loss of our chairman, Charles Sercombe during the year. There is an obituary to this outstanding man following in this publication (page 18).

On a positive note, we witnessed the new Carlisle Supreme sale in late June with Harrison and Hetherington to great success. We worked our way round the current movement restrictions and featured animals from Northern Ireland via video link.

Congratulations to Graham Foster with his top priced ram lamb selling for 10,000gns. This sale did not detract from our annual event in Worcester Market with the Logie Durno taking the championship ticket and top price of 6200gns with a shearling ram. We will continue to run these two sales and hopefully one day the Carlisle event will be an export sale.

Society finances are in good shape. Council took the decision to raise registration fees by a small amount and this has contributed to a healthy surplus for the year. We have also found ways to reduce costs without impacting on our service to members. In November we agreed to give back to members by reducing the charges for DNA testing. This has two-fold advantages. Firstly, your costs as breeders and sale vendors will be less and we gain more genetic information on our breed, which will deliver dividends for the future.

Commercial trade for rams has remained strong, with our breed making top prices around the country at numerous locations. Breeders do not have to rely on Society sales as there are now a wide range of outlets for breeding stock, such as selling through local markets, off farm and through social media. Whichever you choose, remember our generic marketing of the breed all helps with those sales. Registered females continue to attract keen buyers with all sales returning excellent averages and top prices.

We thank all Council members and regional officers who give up their time to work on behalf of all members and welcome Patrick Tully as our new national chairman.

SIRES OF LAMBS

Remember that the sire of your 2025 lambs MUST have:

- * A scrapie genotype result
- * A DNA completed sample
- Be fully pedigree registered

If any of this information is missing, then we will contact you and put your birth notifications on hold until it is completed and supplied to the Society. As we build up more information on the Neogen database, we are in a position to sire verify a higher percentage of lambs. This year all animals entered for our Premier Sales will require to have been verified.

AI AND ET CERTIFICATES

All flocks who used AI and/or ET to produce their lambs must submit a signed and dated document from the veterinary surgeon who undertook the procedure. A copy of the breeding company paperwork supplied with details of ewes, rams, dates etc is acceptable.

Again, until we receive this paperwork your birth notifications will be put on hold. You will be invoiced for the registrations at the time they are submitted.



NEWS FROM NOVEMBER COUNCIL MEETING

FINANCES

The meeting received a report from the F&GP committee and figures for income and expenditure up to the end of October 2024. These showed the Society was on target with their budgets and should achieve a modest surplus by the end of the year. The sound financial position of the Society instigated the conversation on how we should best help members.

F&GP COMMITTEE

Council agreed to invite Mr Robert Gregory to join the F&GP committee as an independent member. His knowledge and enthusiasm for the breed and the running of the Society is considerable.

CATALOGUES

The meeting also agreed that the Society office would only mail out catalogues for the three Premier Sales; Carlisle, Worcester and Dungannon. All other sales would have printed copies available at the sale and online. We will also email catalogues for all sales.



This brings the figures more in line with enhanced cull prices.



REGIONAL ELECTIONS

There will be three elections in 2025: East of England, North of England and Central Region.

Stuart Dunkley and David Norman are not eligible for a further term of office, while David Roberts is eligible for another term. All nomination and voting papers will be sent out from the office in early spring.

BTV UPDATE

The UK's Chief Veterinary Officer has announced on the 21st January that we are now in the seasonally vector low period for Bluetongue virus. Due to a decrease in temperature, midge activity is lower, with midges not actively feeding, meaning there is a very low risk of new infections from biting midges.

As a result, some restrictions currently in place to mitigate disease spread will be eased. These include: removing the requirements for postmovement testing of animals out of the Restricted Zone and the need to send animals moving outside of the Restricted Zone for slaughter to designated abattoirs. Farmers are urged to remain vigilant and report any livestock they suspect to have the disease to APHA.

The disease is very likely to over winter from 2024 into 2025 and will therefore reappear earlier than August (when it entered in 2024). While BTV3 appears to be circulating in some areas at a low level even now, another consideration is that before vector activity increases again, there is time to get livestock vaccinated and establish immunity before exposure. It takes several weeks between initial vaccination and onset of immunity, especially in cattle, therefore waiting to vaccinate until the virus has spread to the local area may be too late to provide adequate, timely protection where it is estimated that the mortality rate was 70% for those sheep with clinical signs last year. Midge activity started in March 2024, so this may come sooner than we would like.

While the safety of the vaccines has not been established in breeding males, these are often the highest value animals on the farm. There is evidence that some males never clear BTV infection from semen, even if they recover from clinical disease. Breeding males should not be vaccinated in the 8 weeks before breeding. Another good reason to vaccinate them this winter, and ideally before mid-March. Whilst vaccination is not a guaranteed prevention to BTV, it does significantly reduce the mortality rates as shown in Germany reducing the overall flock mortality from 25-30% in unvaccinated flocks down to 1-2% in vaccinated flocks.

MV TESTING IN NORTHERN IRELAND

At present DAERA are reconsidering their position on MV testing in Northern Ireland. It is hoped they will continue with funding of the testing scheme and NI will retain its MV freedom status.

NEW FLOCKS WEBINAR

If you are new to the Charollais breed and would like some information on our registration systems, structure, sales, events and anything else you would like to ask us, then join in on webinar sessions.

The Society ran the first one in February and subject to demand, another will follow later in the year. The office will send everyone a link in the Bulletins, so keep an eye out for further information. If there is a subject new members would like to discuss in greater detail, then let us know and we will add it into the presentation.

BIRTH NOTIFICATION INFORMATION

Remember in order to birth notify your lambs:

- The dam must be full pedigree registered. Have you checked all your shearling ewes that are now coming up to lamb have been upgraded?
- 2. The sire must be full pedigree registered. Rams must have a result for Scrapie Genotype and a DNA profile. Get a test kit from us if you have sires to test and upgrade.
- 3. When lambs are the product of embryo transfer, then the donor ewe must have a DNA sample recorded.
- 4. When lambs are the product of artificial insemination or embryo transfer then you must submit a signed document from the veterinary surgeon carrying out the procedure, which includes the date this was done.

WHAT HAS PERFORMANCE RECORDING REALLY DELIVERED FOR CHAROLLAIS SHEEP

For nearly 50 years Charollais breeders have measured the performance of lambs on their farms with the aim of enhancing their value at the abattoir.


This hasn't been their sole focus, as they have also worked to produce fit, fertile and structurally correct sires, but by measuring lamb growth rates and using ultrasound scanning to assess muscling they have continually sought to enhance the carcass attributes of Charollais sired lambs.

The challenge in this approach is that it has always focussed on proxy measures for the traits of economic interest, namely carcase weight, conformation and days to slaughter. Through the involvement of Charollais breeders in RamCompare, the National Progeny Test, which includes data from RamCompare's little cousin, ChazCompare, we now have a much better understanding of the genetic relationships that exist between those traits measured in the live animal within our pedigree flocks and those attributes expressed at the abattoir by commercial lambs at the point of slaughter.

In 2025 the National Terminal Sire Evaluation will be enhanced to produce breeding values that are direct predictors of abattoir traits, using the flow of data from both pedigree farms and progeny tests. For the first time producers will be able to confidently select rams on the basis of their EBVs for days to slaughter, carcass weight, conformation and fat class.

DATA ANALYSIS

The latest results derived from AHDB funded research shows exactly what the Charollais breed has achieved through performance recording.



Increasing breeding values for scan weight (an indicator of liveweight gain) has led to reductions in days to slaughter of more than a week accompanied by increases in carcass weight that now exceed half a kilo. Selection for muscling has increased carcass conformation, with little change in carcass fatness over the last 20 years.

HOW CAN CHAROLLAIS RAM BUYERS USE THIS DATA?

When buying Charollais rams, commercial ram buyers should select stock sires with high EBVs for scan weight and muscle depth if they wish lambs to finish quickly and receive a premium for conformation.

In addition to this ram buyers can start using the new breeding values for abattoir traits, such as days to slaughter and carcass conformation to refine breeding decisions and capitalise on the best genetics the breed has to offer.



THE ROLE OF GENOMICS IN ASSESSING EMBRYO TRANSFER LAMBS


Despite sharing the same parents, embryo transfer siblings are not identical, both genetically and phenotypically, so they won't have the same breeding values.

However, the use of genomic data in Signet's genetic analyses means that it is possible to indentify exactly which genes are passed on to the progeny from a specific mating and breeding values will reflect this.

When trying to assess the breeding merit of an unrecorded sheep in a pre-genomic era we would know that siblings obtained 50% of their genes from each parent and on that basis lambs would automatically get a breeding value based on "mid-parent average" i.e. half-way between either parent. In this real-life example, a Charollais ewe yielded a number of embryos and while none of the lambs were weight recorded; the use of genomic information from Charollais lambs that had been weight recorded identified important differences between them.

In the graph below it can be seen that even with a relatively small increase in accuracy it is possible to identify a lamb that is genetically superior to either parent and one that is 26 index points lower than would initially be predicted from this mating.

A difference of more than 50 index points between full ET offspring, highlights the potential in using genomic information to identify elite breeding stock within a Charollais population that often contains sheep with quite similar genetics.

CHAROLLAIS BREEDERS SAY GOODBYE TO CHARLES SERCOMBE

In August 2024 the sheep industry was shocked and deeply saddened by the news of Charles Sercombe's death at just the age of 59 years old. This was following a cancer diagnosis, which the medical teams were not able to suppress. Charles has been an integral part of the Charollais Sheep Society and one of its strongest supporters for 37 years and a close friend to many of us in the livestock sector.

I recall in 1987 a young, fresh-faced farmer purchasing his first Charollais, closely followed by a trip to France to inject some imported stock into his Dalby Flock, 'PE'. It soon became apparent that this young man not only had bags of energy and enthusiasm for this new breed that had found its way to the UK, but also a considerable skill in breeding pedigree livestock.

The Society and the breed have been extremely lucky to have Charles's support over these years. The flock has produced many top show and sale sheep in the breed and held a number of records for top prices. Dalby stock have won championships at all the major shows across the UK and the flock has supported local shows consistently to keep the breed in the spotlight.

But Charles was not one to solely concentrate on his own stock and farming enterprises. He had a passionate interest in the sheep industry and gave his time and intellect to serve on many boards, groups and Government committees. For the Charollais Sheep Society he served as Eastern region chairman, judges committee member, F & G P chairman and was the National chairman at the time of his death. We were all so fortunate to attend the 2024 National AGM at Sandlands Farm and celebrate with friends in best Eastern region style. This was not the first time the Sercombe family had been host to a major Charollais event; many times we have been entertained and thrilled to view the top quality stock on the farm.

Charles loved the show ring. Whether exhibiting or judging, he was certainly a master of both skills. He officiated at all the major Royals and was a top ranked judge of not only the Charollais breed, but several others. But it was not all looks that were important to Charles in his breeding programme. He was a passionate supporter of performance recording and all that entailed and brought to sheep breeding. He was an original member of the Charollais Sire Reference Scheme and more latterly a flock in Signet's Ram Compare trial work, always looking for ways to improve his flock through scientific methods not only for his own rewards but to take the UK sheep industry forward.

Among the organisations that paid tribute to Charles were the NFU and NSA. Phil Stocker, NSA Chief Executive, said: "It is impossible to measure the impact Charles had on our industry. He had real vision and was absolutely committed to improving sheep efficiency, best practice and viability. Yet he never lost sight of the community aspect of our industry and knew the importance of sheep farming to provide a step on the farming ladder for new entrants.

"Charles was a progressive and highly ethical agent of change. His impact was far wider than the UK alone and I had the privilege of travelling to France, China and New Zealand with him, where he made a great impression and earned friends for life.





"Another memory that will last forever was when he told the Sheep Health and Welfare Group's conference he wanted Britain to be the best sheep farming nation in the world. He believed we could do it and got involved in activities to help achieve it. It's an ambition we can all sign up to and carry on in Charles's memory."

NFU Deputy President David Exwood joined the tributes. "Charles was a passionate advocate for tenant farmers and the sheep sector. He was NFU Melton Mowbray branch chair from 2007 to 2010, serving four consecutive terms in the role. His dedication and knowledge were invaluable and he will be fondly remembered right across the farming industry. He became NFU Livestock Board chair in 2012 holding the national post for six years and was also a member of the NFU Policy Board and Governance Board. Charles led the National Livestock Board through a time of great uncertainty for the beef and lamb sector. His dedication and knowledge at such a time were invaluable and he will be fondly remembered right across the farming industry."

The Charollais Society has lost a dear friend and devoted supporter of the breed and the sheep industry has lost a highly skilled and intelligent ambassador. We are delighted that Charles's wife Helen, together with children Victoria, Grace and William are carrying on his work and we send our love and support to them for the future.



Future use of embryo transfer (ET) will, potentially, be more regulated and may well be combined with other technologies such as, sexed semen, in vitro fertilisation (IVF) and gene editing.

Vet Ian McDougall of Shropshire-based Farmgene says the rapid expansion of ET use which has occurred over the last 20 years is already slowing and is likely to reduce further in the coming years as farm budgets come under pressure from reductions in support payments and higher costs throughout businesses.

"We've seen rising costs across sheep farming over the last five years, including higher feed and fertiliser costs, as well as more expensive energy and labour charges. All of this is impacting bottom lines and added to increased costs of ET due to higher drug costs, is having an effect on the amount of ET being done in many breeds," he explains.

From a regulatory standpoint it is possible to see that a ban on the current surgical method of embryo collection may be implemented, along with regulation of recipient selection, he explains.

"On the animal welfare side, both of these would be areas which welfare groups could lobby on. Additionally, there is potential for a ban on the use of PMSG based on the animal welfare issues of its manufacture. It is important to note that PMSG use is already banned in Switzerland.

"The surge in ET over the last two decades has been fuelled by the rising popularity of certain breeds and the importation of new breeds and a demand to 'cash in' on the best genetics within those breeds while they are still novel," says Mr McDougall.

Other challenges include the chance that breed societies may change their rules around

the use of ET, (the Valais Blacknose Sheep Society currently charges £250 to register an ET lamb), as well as the potential for a reduction in demand for UK genetics from overseas markets.

"To improve the animal welfare outcomes, it may be that we see a switch to laparoscopic embryo recovery from conventionally super ovulated donors and a move to IVF with laparoscopically collected ova. However, currently both the latter option and cervical embryo collection are not commercially viable.

"Thankfully, there are alternatives to PMSG, including the use of Kisspeptin analogue C6 in its place, as well as the use of teaser rams to synchronise ewes and moving ET further into the ewe's natural cycle. We could also amend superovulation protocols, so PMSG is not required," he explains.

Mr McDougall says that if the aim of ET is to improve the genetic value of a flock, then donor selection may also come under scrutiny. "I can envisage a world where donor ewes are more rigorously selected, including selecting for traits such as tolerance to roundworms, footrot resilience, lower methane emissions and increased feed efficiency.

"These are areas where commercial demand could outweigh the current, more aesthetic, selection criteria used by many using ET. "On top of these, selecting for traits such as improved eating quality and easy lambing and high lamb survival in terminal sire breeds could result in a shift in focus too."

Overall, he believes that while ET will still be a valuable breeding tool in 10 years time, how it is used will probably change. "I foresee the pedigree sector shrinking over the next decade and the emergence of more breeding companies making use of technologies such as IVF and possibly gene editing.

"There's a chance exports may increase if British sheep genetics are in vogue elsewhere in the world, but what those genetics could be, might be different to those that are currently being sought out.

"Either way I believe sexed semen must be available in the sheep sector in the next decade to truly harness the power of ET and advanced breeding technologies."

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WELCOME TO THE EASTERN REGION

Let's introduce you to the Eastern region of the Society, not the most densely populated area for sheep and for good reason! We are historically the driest part of the UK and although crops grow well, grass tends not to. We cover all the counties on the eastern side of England from Lincolnshire/ Derbyshire in the north right past London to Kent and Sussex which has its complications for travelling to meetings and events. But despite these concerns the region has punched above its weight over the years.

Firstly, the breed started in Norfolk. On Boxing Day 1976 five ewe lambs and one ram lamb arrived from France to Cavick House Farm in Wymondham. They were imported by the Barber family – father John, mother Anne, sons Jonathan and David and myself (Jonathan's wife to be at the time). The family then set about a plan to promote this rather strange looking breed to the rest of the UK and the British Charollais Sheep Society was born. And to this day is still based in Wymondham, Norfolk.

Many notable flocks came from the region in the early days. Even Frenchman Paul Mascaux who lives in Essex purchased stock in 1979 and was most helpful with negotiations in France for those early importations. Philip Ashford from Norfolk was not far behind and was a significant breeder and National chairman of the Society from 1994 – 1997.

Many Eastern Region flocks were instrumental in the formation of the Charollais Sire Referencing Scheme which has allowed progress to be made in performance data recording over the decades. The groups included well known flocks such as Cold Harbour, Crogham, Dalby, Hazelwood, Hyde, Tilton and Rutland.

For many years Eastern region flocks have been at the top in both show and sale rings. David Gardiner from Derbyshire dominated the royal shows during the 90's. No one who ever met the German jockey, turned dog breeder and Charollais owner would forget Gunther Knoerzer with his Brandy House flock in Newark, an abundant winner and sale topper.

Then it was the turn of Mary and Richard Tulloch from Rutland to be the ones to beat. Charles Sercombe started picking up championship tickets across the UK and selling stock for record breaking prices, many of which still stand today.

Animals purchased from Eastern region flocks have gone on to be highly influential for their buyers and for the breed. At the Rutland flock dispersal sale, William Ingram purchased (for a very low price) ZFY 5122 who had 35 progeny registered in flock ZNN, many of whom were show winners and top priced animals, including top stock ram Logie Durno Jackpot. Crogham Hannibal II was the leading sire for many years for the Logie Durno flock and the figures for his progeny sales are unlikely to ever be beaten.

Today our young breeders are pushing hard to carry on the name and reputation of the East. George Hoggard was champion at Worcester in 2023 with a ewe lamb from his Manor House flock in Newark. Meanwhile, Mitchel and Elizabeth Britten are certainly making their mark at the sales; winning the ram lamb championship at last year's Worcester Premier Sale with their Cavick lamb (Read more about the Cavick flock on page 31).

A special mention must go to Victoria, William and Grace Sercombe, who together with their mum, Helen, are carrying on the fantastic work of Charles with the Dalby flock, which we are certain will continue to be amongst the best flocks in the UK.

This year we will welcome a new chairperson to lead our region. Our thanks go to Stuart Dunkley who has now completed his second term of office for the region. We look forward to a packed programme of events and interaction with many members old and new.

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A WALK THROUGH THE SULWOOD FLOCK HISTORY BOOKS

The term 'stalwarts of a breed' can easily get brandished about regularly within the sheep world, but never is it a truer reflection of a couple than **Geoff** and **Carol Watson**, whose unrivalled passion for the Charollais breed has resulted in interbreed championships the length and breadth of the UK.



From Leicestershire to Anglesey and from Bath and West to the Highland, if Geoff and Carol haven't trimmed a winner under the successful A-Team sheep trimming business, then they've probably won it with one from their own Sulwood flock.

A passion for the Oxford Down breed drew the couple together in 1991 after Carol had asked Geoff to trim a sheep for her at a show.

Having agreed to trim "just the one", Carol learnt as much as she could from the master of his craft and returned to the Royal Norfolk Show that year with a sheep she had trimmed herself and proceeded to win. Their love for sheep showing and presentation has cemented a successful career in trimming for many noted breeders throughout the UK, as well as themselves.

A move to Herefordshire in their early years saw the couple's first encounter with the Charollais breed, however, not all was positive to start with, as they recall. "We still had our Oxfords and also ran a few Berrichons, but the Oxford was outperforming the others for quick growth rates and fleshing ability," comments Carol. In 1997 a change of job meant Geoff was now farm manager for Charles Winfrey in Sibson, Peterborough. The farm was already running Signet recorded Texels and Geoff and Carol managed to persuade them to try a Charollais x Oxford ram on the flock of recently established commercial Lleyns as a comparison.

This slowly morphed into a wider use of the Charollais, so two tups were purchased from Tim Prichard resulting in what Geoff terms a dream of a Charollais x Lleyn. "We then ran the Oxford back over them as lambs to maximise production from them."

Sadly, Foot-and-Mouth disease struck and after Charles Winfrey passed, the farm was sold and reverted to arable production with all sheep sold for re-stocking purposes. Geoff recalls how the purchasers of the Lleyn flock had previously run Rouge tups across them, but they had been so impressed with the Charollais as a terminal sire that they were soon converted.

We first started using an Oxford x Charollais ram then worked with Charollais x Lleyn females which were a dream of a commercial ewe.

In 2001 Geoff took over the management of Messrs Overman and Son's Osco flock. "The flock was very much a work in progress and by that time we were running our own small flock under the Sulwood prefix with early purchases from Lionel Organ," recalls Geoff.

"At that point breeders were getting to grips with Scrapie genotyping and with the news that the stock ram was a group five, many sheep were slaughtered in order to run a group one and group two flock," comments Carol.



The couple went to do a day's work trimming at the Brettles flock and came home with Brettles Angelo, a tup that bred quality females for the Osco flock, while Castellau Banker was then purchased to help improve the scrapie resistance of the flock.

Meanwhile, the Sulwood flock was also growing with purchases from Hyde and Dalby and in 2003, Farmers Guardian accidently broke the news to Geoff during a spontaneous phone interview that the Osco flock was to be dispersed.

Having been made redundant three times in a row, Geoff and Carol decided to focus on their own Sulwood enterprise and purchased the entire Osco flock. "We split the 120-ewe flock with a commercial producer taking the lower end genotyped females and we kept the rest," says Carol.

Further purchases were added to the flock including females from Rowland Harris and Dai Morris. "The beauty of trimming for other breeders meant we found sheep on the trimming stands that perhaps would go unnoticed in the sale," adds Carol. "We purchased the last ewe lamb in Dai's sale and she went on to produce Sulwood Lady Bird, a five-time interbreed champion as a one-crop ewe before producing at least six tups herself that have been sold well privately."

Nicknamed "Scud" she lambed twins at 13 years of age with her ram lamb being the first to be sold off farm and the ewe lamb was the last shearling ewe to be sold in the couple's production sale at Skipton last year.

The beauty of trimming for other breeders meant we found sheep on the trimming stands that perhaps would go unnoticed in the sale.

The couple then fully emersed themselves in the show circuit exhibiting at some 10-12 shows in a summer. "We lived for the shows, whether it was trimming for others or with our own sheep, the competition was fierce, but the camaraderie and fun with fellow exhibitors was something that has left many positive memories for us."

But not all memories were positive, some were simply hilarious, as Carol can't help but recall the time Geoff and fellow breeder Percy Tait returned home from the Royal Highland Show and realised they had left the Charollais show team behind, including the notable Pride of Knighton. "By the time we headed to the Royal Show, the news was rife and notes of 'Daddy don't leave me behind this time' were plastered above Percy's pens!"

Notable tups used within the Sulwood flock include Trevadlock Duncan and then later





Castellau Freelander who was purchased at the Welsh AGM and produced the Great Yorkshire Show interbreed champion Sulwood Gracious Lady. She then stood reserve at the Royal Welsh that summer to Charles Sercombe's Rockvilla Golden Promise. "That year will always be full of fond memories, particularly as Geoff was presented to the late Queen at the Great Yorkshire Show," adds Carol.

We lived for the shows, whether it was trimming for others or taking our own sheep.

Bincombe Kirkpatrick then produced the multi award winning Sulwood Over The Moon and she herself has produced so many success stories for the flock, along with another by Kirkpatrick that was sold to Messrs Christie and Bell and became the All-Ireland champion two years in a row.

Maerdy Nomad was purchased from Myfyr Evans as an aged ram at the Premier Sale. "He had a tight skin and plenty of muscle and being the first sheep in the ring we stole him with one bid at 500gns. "Long, hard as a rock, but a temper that meant loading him at the market was eventful," recalls Geoff. "He produced impressive females for the flock."

Geoff and Carol strongly believe their female lines speak for themselves being show winners and also top breeding ewes that milk well and produce more winners generation after generation. Examples of such standards being Kinky Kitten and her daughter Proper Job, who both won at The Royal Norfolk, Great Yorkshire and Masham shows.

"When selecting stock rams our first thought was always if they would click with the girls, rather than whether the ram's pedigree was flavour of the month," comments Carol. They believe in breeding what you are happy to look at in your paddock not just to follow the masses.

"Spend time watching your stock, select a small number from each section and give them TLC and plenty of exercise. The show sheep will come to the fore. The team need bringing on to be able to compete at Newark in May and still be winning at Masham at the end of September. They must be fit not fat and turned out to the best of your ability," she adds.

Having had two production sales at Skipton, the first blowing all expectations of trade for Geoff and Carol, resulting in a dual top price of 2000gns, the flock is now under a new joint ownership of Messrs Watson and Bennett. Their grandchildren Florence and Oscar are catching the Charollais bug and will be ultimately taking care of the sheep in Somerset alongside mum and dad, Ann-Marie and Luke.

"We obviously reduced heavily due to losing ground, but we hope to start back up with the children by passing on our knowledge and skillset. They're incredibly passionate and without a doubt the breed must do all it can to encourage the next generation of Charollais breeders," adds Carol.





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PASSION AND DEDICATION IS KEY FOR THE CAVICK FLOCK

Some would say farming pedigree livestock in East Anglia is not without its challenges, including the distance from main pedigree livestock auctioneers, let alone the current threats and issues surrounding Bluetongue virus.



However, one young couple have certainly made their mark in the Charollais breed, showing that hard work, passion and dedication will always reap their reward.

The Cavick flock was established in 2012 by Mitchel and Elizabeth Britten. Mitchel had no prior background in livestock production and was studying computer science at the University of East Anglia. Elizabeth had grown up at Cavick Farm where she had experience of sheep and poultry breeding.

Together the couple began their passion for Charollais sheep and combined their savings to purchase 11 shearling ewes from the nearby Crogham flock.

They began using artificial insemination with purchased semen from Tony and June Gregory in the form of Logie Durno Navigator. They later purchased Loanhead Midas Touch privately from the Ingram family which set about the first turning point for the flock.

One of the best females from early foundations was 288, which when bred to Midas Touch produced 380 who has been the mother of the noted 15,000gns Cavick What A Boy! and his sister, the 4000gns Cavick What A Girl. "She's still breeding today with 38 registered progeny off her", adds Elizabeth.

"Not only is Midas Touch responsible for that successful breeding line, but a group of his shearling rams also won at Melton Mowbray and the following year we won the champion pen of ram lambs," comments Mitchel.

Some five or six females were then purchased from the Kingsland dispersal which then resulted in the desire to try embryo transfer.

A decision to run a commercial flock alongside the Cavick pedigrees saw the couple establish a 140-ewe Lleyn flock, with homebred Charollais rams from the Cavick flock the chosen stock sires, producing lamb for a strong boxed lamb trade sold off farm.

Midas Touch is responsible for great breeding females, but he also bred the best pen of ram lambs at Melton Mowbray Sale.

"It proved a hit with customers and while the pedigree bug was driving us, we also realised we needed a solid commercial base for our sheep income," explains Mitchel.

The couple also dabbled with a little showing to try and promote the flock, but at the time the cost of showing seemed to outweigh the benefit, so decided to stick to sales.

2020 saw yet another turning point for the couple as they took the champion ram lamb pen at Melton Mowbray and featured on the popular Farmers Country Showdown programme. "The programme certainly raised awareness locally for us and helped sales from the on-farm café," adds Elizabeth.

The same year saw the purchase of Loanhead Vanquish, bought privately again from the Ingram family. "We always admired their sheep at sales and liked the genetics they were using, so decided to follow a similar path," highlights Mitchel.

"Not only have we acquired knowledge and genetics from the Aberdeenshire-based Ingram family, but have developed a strong friendship with the family as well, something that only the pedigree world really offers you," adds Elizabeth.

Vanquish was purchased blind, but he soon took the flock to another level with his heavy muscling, natural chest width and level tops, he's certainly cemented a type of sheep the Cavick flock is now known for.

Mitchel recalls that somewhere along his sales travels, a breeder told him it would take at least 10 years to breed anything decent or get to where you need to be and on year nine a trip to the Premier Sale in Worcester resulted in the top price of the day for Cavick What A Boy!

all with very commercial breeding goals at the heart of their flocks.

"Two years later I was standing at Geoff Probert's open day looking at shearling rams heading to Builth later in the year and included in that group were impressive looking sons of What A Boy! It's a feeling that's better than selling the tup himself," she adds.

The success of What A Boy! opened doors for Mitchel and Elizabeth, resulting in an invite to

the Females with Figures Sale in Worcester at the start of the following sales season. "We needed to build on the success of the previous ram sale and get our females out in front of breeders. A steady sale with a lot of online interest thanks to pre-sale marketing saw a good run of trade, topping at 1600gns for a sister of What A Boy!," recalls Elizabeth.


"At this point we were producing a certain type, thick ended, slightly pinker head and deep and wide. We wanted to offer something for everyone, a strong pedigree breeder's tup, but a solid commercial breeder's ram as well," adds Mitchel.


Joining the sire line up team in 2022 was the 7000gns Loanhead Al Pacino. "He has bred some phenomenal females with great size, muscling and his rams have great breed character and spark," adds Mitchel.

In 2023 the couple then sold Cavick Blood Diamond to the Ingram family in a private deal which then went on to produce a Royal Highland Show champion. The couple also retained a homebred ram lamb by Al Pacino that same year in the form of Cavick Balenciaga with a share sold to Mike Jones, Wren and Dewi Evans, Ffrwd.

The following year saw the couple tick another dream off the bucket list, securing the ram lamb championship at the Premier Show and Sale at Worcester with a Balenciaga son, Cavick Cracker, who sold for the third highest price on the day, selling for 5800gns.

Now with young son George joining the family, the passion for the Charollais breed is probably at its strongest for the Britten

family. "You have to work hard to get a name for yourself in the breed and it's certainly not just about doing well at sales. Everything from careful planning what you put on social media to promote the sales, from choosing the right genetics is something that takes a lot of dedication," adds Mitchel, who alongside his work for Shearwell Data is also responsible for 2000 finishing pigs a year.

We were producing a certain type - a thick ended, deep, wide and pinker type of sheep.

Looking towards the future the couple say they're looking to slow down on the ET work and possibly look at shearling ram sales. "This has come more off the concerns of Bluetongue, so we're wary of putting a lot of effort into ram lambs this year that might not be able to make the sales," he adds.

"We're currently running 60 ewes with a further 15 shearling ewes following, but the plan would be to push numbers slightly to enable selling up to 70 tups a year," believes Mitchel.



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LOANINGFOOT HOSTS JUDGES TRAINING DAY

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ROBLESTON SHEARLING RAMS IN DEMAND AT NSA BUILTH MAIN SALE TO A HIGH OF 3500GNS

The Robleston flock of Messrs R G and R A Jones and Son, Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire, hit the headlines at last year's **NSA Main Sale at Builth** with their reserve champion shearling ram, Robleston 23WGN06348, selling for 3500gns.



By Boyo Vancouver and out of a Gwyndy female by Wernfawr Vinnie, this one sold in a twoway partnership with J A D and P M Owens, Shobdon, Herefordshire and D Roberts, Shrewsbury, Shropshire.

The Robleston flock remained strong with a 2000gns price tag for another shearling ram, Robleston 23WGN06308, a son of Loanhead Washington, this time out of a homebred female by Arbryn Tonto. Taking this one home was R Swift, Little Onn, Staffordshire. Their incredibly strong run of shearling saw the Jones family top the pen averages at £1143.58 for 23 sold.

Three shearling rams then secured a 1600gns price tag, the first being the pre-sale show champion, Mortimer 23HH07942, from Geoff Probert, Worcester and judged by Deborah Whitcher of the Galtres flock. By Thackwood U Corker and out of a homebred female by Thackwood Topflight, this one was knocked down to J Gwilliam and Sons, Craven Arms, Shropshire. The Mortimer flock sold their run of 30 shearling rams to average £1022.00. Also, at 1600gns were two from the Robleston pen in the form of Robleston 23WGN06290 and then the following lot, Robleston 23WGN06359. The first being by Bronwydd Terminator and out of an Arbryn Nugget daughter found a new home with W C G Davies and Son, Dolwen, Powys. His pen mate at the same price, a Robleston Avici son, joined him.

Meanwhile, at 1500gns was another from Geoff Probert's pen, Mortimer 23HH08405, this time by the 15,000gns Cavick What A Boy! and out of a Foulrice Spot On daughter. The buyer here was Lutton Farm, Steeple, Dorset.

Four shearling rams then shared a 1300gns price tag, the first being Foulrice 23DG13016 from Charles and Stephen Marwood, Whenby, Nr York. By Lowerye Vulcan and out of a homebred Foulrice Osprey daughter, this one was knocked down to previous buyer J Gwilliam, Craven Arms, Shropshire.

Two from the Gwyndy flock of Colin and Ros Bowen, Haverfordwest, Pembrokeshire, then shared a 1300gns price tag and helped push their pen average to £966 for 19 sold. Their first was Gwyndy 23XPR08793, a Boyo Vancouver son going back to Padest Sir Lancelot which was the choice of G and K Goulding, Cugley, Glos. Meanwhile, their second, Gwyndy 23XPR08775, another Vancouver son, this time out of a Banwy Picasso daughter, caught the eye of T and M Lewis, Llanbister, Powys.

Wrapping up proceedings with a 1300gns price tag was another from the Jones family's pen in the form of Robleston 23WGN06305, another by Loanhead Washington. This one saw the hammer fall to G Jones, Conwy.

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MEET THE NEW CHAROLLAIS CHAIRMAN – PATRICK TULLY

My flock has changed tremendously since purchasing my two original ewes from Peter Coombs, quickly followed by another two from Viv Crocker back in 1988. We now keep 20 strong ewes mainly home bred, occasionally buying something that catches my eye! It's a small flock run alongside work commitments and other passions and hobbies.

Recalling successful tups over the years Glyncoch JPR bred us some really good, eye catching large bodied ewes and Artnagulion Ulysses put some shape into the ewes with the added bonus of good skins. We are now looking at lambs at foot from our latest Logie purchase (jointly with Robert Hopper) and very pleased with the results.



We have not shown sheep in the past years due to time constraints and no one to share the load juggling between work and sheep commitments. However, the flock has achieved many breed and interbreed championships in the south west of England over the years.

Having been in the breed for many years, I am lucky enough to achieve good money for shearling rams sold from home to local farmers who return year after year, with the knowledge that the rams will do them well, so I admit, this has made me lazy in getting sheep ready for pedigree sales. However, I have sold rams to pedigree breeders which have brought them success.

QUICK FIRE ROUND WITH PATRICK TULLY

Q Any work and hobbies outside of farming sheep?

I am in the building trade, mainly new builds and barn conversions for individuals in the area.

I am also the chair of the Parish Council, and vice chair of the Over Stowey Village Hall and Recreation Ground, taking the lead role in the management of the social club, opening the bar every Friday night and for social functions held at the hall, raising about £50,000 a year to ensure the future of the Charity that has three properties in the Village.

Q What do you do to relax?

A Horse racing. We have been fortunate enough to have owned, bred and raced five horses with success. Dashel Drasher is probably the best horse to date and one that has given us the most fun. Drash on Ruby is consistent if nothing else having been placed in each of her runs and Jiggy Waller is a promising youngster following on behind. I also love holidays and socialising – I'm a great believer in the "work hard, play hard" ethos!

Q What do you feel is the biggest positive about the Charollais breed?

- A They do what they say on the label. We sell to a farm that runs Suffolk cross mules, they pick lambs to sell from nine to 10 weeks, consistently meeting the grade.
- Q How do you feel the breed needs to evolve to cope with a sector where costs are increasing and farming hoops are getting bigger to jump through?
- A Keep pushing the merits of the breed, keeping the standard high, thus achieving the best prices we can get. Farming is no different to any other industry, being efficient and not afraid to change the way things have been done in the past should be encouraged.

- Q Celebrity dinner for six which five stars of any sector/ industry are you inviting and what would be on the menu?
- A James Martin, Shark Hanlon, Matt Chapman, Luke Harvey and Lee Mack - Smoked Salmon, Beef Wellington, Cheese Board accompanied by a good wine and glass of port!

Q Name 3 things you are determined to do while you chair the Charollais breed?

A Keep the Charollais at the forefront of the terminal sire table, through modern technology, good breeding, prominent in the show ring, without losing the good traits the Charollais is known for.



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THE ROLE OF GENOMIC INFORMATION IN BREEDING BETTER CHAROLLAIS SHEEP


Genomics in the dairy sector is fast becoming common place with one in four Holstein Friesian milk recorded heifers being tested last year and other ruminant sectors are hot on their heels.

The Charollais breed now has more than 2500K genotypes thanks in part to the collection of samples through AHDB/HCC/QMS funded projects like RamCompare (which has also enabled historic Charollais reference rams to be genotyped) and also the move by the Society, to ask all vendors of lambs entered into the Premier Sale and owners of stock sires to have a sample taken for parentage verification. The establishment of a bank of genotypes is the first stage in being able to set up genomic evaluations.

WHERE ARE WE NOW?

Genotype numbers for the breed have increased dramatically for animals born in recent years, noting that these will increase if animals are tested later in life (older stock tups or donor ewes). Based on the Charollais Sheep Society's current policy these are required to be sampled for the verification of parentage.

It isn't uncommon to identify errors in pedigree submissions, but through the use of genomics these can now be corrected quickly, which in turn helps with breeding decisions when choosing sires to be used and minimise inbreeding.

This spring will see the release of genomic breeding values for three of the terminal sire breeds evaluated through Signet (Charollais, Suffolk and Hampshire Down), following in the footsteps of Signet's work with Hill Sheep which lead to releasing GEBVs in 2022. This means that the new genomic evaluations of an animal are based on its pedigree information, performance recording data and progeny performance (if available) plus the genomic data (or simply put its DNA).

To establish genomic evaluations - there is a requirement for genotyped animals that have many measurements - either on themselves or their progeny (and so a high accuracy traditional EBV proof). This is vital to set up a reference population and create a 'SNP key' to indicate which bits of the DNA (or genes) are responsible for each aspect of an animal's performance. Once this is determined, young animals or those with little phenotypic data, can have their DNA compared to this key allowing the prediction of the performance and as a result the performance of animals in the next generation.

Genomic approaches have an advantage over traditional pedigree breeding analyses as they take into account the exact mixture of genes that have been passed down from both parents not just assuming exactly half has been received from each parent. A pedigree index calculation for non-identical twins or full siblings would have the same EBVs. However, genomics can identify which siblings are superior or carry poorer traits in the example of an ET flush.

WHAT ARE WE DOING TO HELP BREEDERS?

Following the decision by Council in November to provide members with support for genotyping by funding 50% of the cost, now is the time to make use of the discount that is committed for the next three years. During my involvement in the dairy industry, in part the success and growth in this area is down to the collaborative effort across industry to support evaluations. By the Society offering this support alongside breeders to reduce the cost, it is a combined effort to help move the breed forward genetically without the whole cost being covered by the breeder. In turn these genotypes will provide the basis for further research to encompass those hard to measure traits into the evaluation.

WHAT IS HAPPENING IN THE SHEEP SECTOR?

The Welsh Hill Sheep project incorporates genomic information (often collected as part of DNA parentage assignment) into Signet's breeding values to generate genomic predictors that are more accurate, informative and reliable. Genomic data was initially used to enhance the breeding values of seven hill breeds, including the North Country Cheviot (Hill type), Scottish Blackface and Welsh Mountain. Genomic approaches are particularly useful for maternal breeds when trying to predict the genetic merit of animals early in their life and when assessing traits with a low genetic component (like lamb survival). that are expensive to measure (like methane production) or that take a lifetime to be expressed (like longevity).

Another maternal based project – Breed4Change is a three-year initiative funded through DEFRA's Farming Innovation Programme. The project will develop EBVs and GEBVs for 'new' environmental traits and use these alongside existing measures of ewe efficiency to develop a selection index that will help to identify the best breeding sheep to reduce methane emissions from the flock.

WHAT DOES THE FUTURE LOOK LIKE?

Hard to measure traits will become more accessible in a genomic world as this allows the introduction of traits where only a subset of the population have well recorded performance. This could lead to the introduction of environmental indexes/traits or those relating to health and welfare. Determining which route will be best in a terminal sire evaluation model is yet to be seen, but useful phenotypes may already exist in the form of CT data which allows the size of the rumen to be calculated and hence providing estimations on the resulting levels of methane production. Alternatively, it may require the collection of data through PAC chambers to measure methane like in the Breed4Change project.

Due to the permanent and cumulative nature of breed improvement, genetic selection (and, therefore, genomics) will have an important role in helping the ruminant sector hit environmental targets. The genomic data being collected on Charollais sheep today will provide an important platform for the Charollais of the future.



Performance Recording Group Committee

This committee was set up in 2023 to create a forum for discussion on all matters pertaining to breed performance and the Charollais breed. The group looks at what is happening within Charollais performance recorded flocks and the Signet scheme and suggests changes and improvements. Commenting on the committee, Carroll Barber explains: "It also has discussed the wider implications of genomic evaluation and what positive aspects that will bring to the breed. The committee reports back to the main Council with recommendations for them to consider. We are very fortunate that we have Victoria Ashmore as our Chair, who not only has a wide breadth of knowledge of data recording and genomics but also a thoroughly practical approach with her own flock." LOGIE DURNO LEADS OKTOBERFEST SALE AT 2200GNS

The in-lamb female sales kicked off at a steady pace last autumn with a new look private sale at Worcester, the **Oktoberfest Sale**, replacing the previous Saucy Sale.

The Ingram family travelled down from Aberdeenshire with consignments from both the Logie Durno and Loanhead flocks and dominated the trade throughout, topping the sale at 2200gns.

Sale leader was Logie Durno 23ZNN49212 from William and Carole Ingram, a Crogham Aries II daughter out of a homebred Logie Durno Umpire daughter that has already produced a former Premier Sale ram lamb champion. Scanned for twins to Moelfryn Corker, this one went home with the breeder of the service sire, Gethin Davies, Llanon, Ceredigion.

Two further females from the same home then shared a 1600gns price tag, the first being Logie Durno 23ZNN49157. A daughter of the 15,000gns Wernfawr Ace and out of a homebred Rhaeadr Orlando daughter, this one is from the same family as the 12,000gns sale leader at the Ingram family's production sale and the 9500gns Logie Durno Walking Thunder. She sold carrying triplets to Moelfryn Corker and was the pick of Messrs Pickles, York, North Yorkshire.

At the same money was Logie Durno 23ZNN49147, another Crogham Aries II daughter, this time out of a Loanhead Talisman daughter. Scanned twins for Corker, Paul Curran purchased her for his Brecon, Powys-based Wernfawr flock.

Three further in-lamb shearling ewes sold for 1250gns. The first of these came from Llandeilo, Carmarthenshire-based Adrian Davies with Glyn Coch 23XCA02104, a Southam Exotic daughter out of a Wedderburn female by Wrenvale Mad 4 Ewe. Al'd and carrying twins to Glyn Coch Ace, the hammer fell to M Lewis, Rhondda, Glamorgan. The next carrying a 1250gns price tag was Loanhead 23WNC49266 from brothers Gregor and Bruce Ingram. By the noted Foxhill Va Va Voom and out of a homebred female by Logie Durno Untouchable, this one is full sister to the first prize ewe lamb at the Highland Show in 2022. Scanned for a single to Corker, this one caught the eye of the Morgan family, Almeley, Herefordshire.

Another Va Va Voom daughter from the same home and scanned for triplets to Corker, then sold for 1250gns to Emily Scaman, Saleby, Lincs.

Two more females from the Loanhead pen then met a 1200gns price tag, the first being a Micklehills Atlas daughter out of a Cannahars Super Star daughter carrying twins to Corker. Dam here produced a 5000gns lamb at the Carlisle Premier. Taking this one north to the Isle of Islay, Argyl, was D Park.

Sharing that same price tag was another Va Va Voom daughter out of a Logie Durno Untouchable daughter. Scanned twins to Corker, the hammer fell to previous buyer Emily Scaman, Saleby, Lincs.

Robleston Be Rich is a son of the 10,000gns Loanhead Washington, out of a homebred female by Rhaeadr Real Deal. He was shown successfully as a lamb in 2023 at the Royal Welsh where he stood first in his class and returned last year to Builth Wells to win the shearling ram class and go one step further to secure the male championship.

The tup has been used in the Robleston flock and semen has been retained for private use. Commenting on the sale, Gareth Jones of the Robleston flock praised the ram for his length, scale and power and added that not many win a class at the Welsh as a lamb and can follow it up the following year as a shearling ram.

Esmor Evans, who runs 60 Charollais sheep alongside 250 Texel ewes, 120 Charolais cows and 60 Limousin cows, added: "He looks the ideal tup with size and shape and should hopefully work well across all types of ewes in the flock. He may even be used on some of the Texels for his crossing ability."


